

## Art and Craft: Materializing Blackness in the US



A Webinar series to investigate the power behind art and craft and how it relates to identity politics of Blackness in the United States

From the period of slavery to contemporary practices, African-American artistic expressions have often blurred the boundaries between art and craft, aesthetic and functional production, unique work and utilitarian object. These hybrid forms, long marginalized or relegated to the margins of artistic institutions, have nonetheless constituted an essential terrain for the affirmation of a singular black aesthetic, resistant and deeply rooted in the historical, cultural and material experiences of African Americans.

Weaving together notions of making, gesture, materiality, intertextuality, and transmission, this webinar will examine the ways in which blackness is materialized across a wide range of media, techniques, and practices.
